This has been a busy spring for UFLA. The UFLA board has planned the details for our 2006 Annual Meeting; several Vitality Awards and the Pat Buckner Collaboration Award have been granted; Utah made a good show at the SWCOLT meeting in Phoenix; and the ULFA membership voted to change the structure of the executive board.

FALL CONFERENCE

Our fall meeting will be on Thursday, November 2, 2006, at Utah Valley State College. We had a very successful meeting there last year and hope to do even better this year. Our keynote speaker will be Dr. Judith Liskin-Gasparro, a respected author and researcher in language teaching. AWARDS

One of the ways UFLA supports teachers in the state is by awarding cash grants of up to \$1000 for projects. UFLA gave out three Teacher Vitality

SWCOLT

Last month SWCOLT had its annual meeting in Phoenix, AZ. Charlotte Touati represented the state admirably as our teacher of the year. In addition, Laurel Shelley presented the "Best of Utah" session on Clubs and Classroom Activities: Academic Fun in Foreign Language. Bev Burdett was selected by the SWCOLT Board to be the new editor of the SWCOLT Newsletter. Several other Utah teachers attended the conference. Next year's SWCOLT meeting will be in fabulous Las Vegas, at the Riviera Hotel (on the strip!) on April 12-14, 2007.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Lastly, many of you voted in favor of a change to our bylaws. When UFLA was originally established, in the 1960s, it was determined that whoever the Utah State Office of Education hired as a foreign language specialist would serve as executive secretary and treasurer to our organization. This worked well for many years. However, since Joan Patterson moved out of that position at the USOE, we have been "assigned" four different treasurers. Most have done very well by us, but each time there is a shift, the State Office threatens to do away with the position altogether. It was therefore the recommendation of the UFLA Board, since approved through a vote of the UFLA membership, that our organization appoint an executive secretary/treasurer. This officer will remain a non-voting member of the UFLA Board (so as to avoid any economic conflict of interest) and in addition will be paid \$400 per year (in order to establish a fiduciary responsibility and not a purely voluntary one.) The term will be for two years but may be extended by the Board. Anyone interested in applying for this position should contact me (tmathews@weber.edu) or any other member of the Board. AWARDS



This year UFLA was able to award three Teacher Vitality Awards and one Pat Buckner Collaborative Teaching Award.

LaRue Urquhart received a Teacher Vitality Award to help with expenses to travel to Peru where she will study Spanish and live with a Peruvian family. After completion of her classes, she plans to travel to other parts of Peru where she will gather teaching materials and film famous sites and festivals. She plans to create a teaching video to bring these events to life for her students.

Richard Tate received a Teacher Vitality Award to help with costs to create and compile a collection of teacher-tested activities, games, and practice exercises to enhance the learning of Spanish throughout the state and to make the collection available via the web.

Jake Sigafus and his colleagues in the Orem Junior High School World Languages Department will receive Vitality Award money to purchase an LCD projector. The teachers in the department will work together to create several learning activities/projects that will help to strengthen their students in the five areas of language learning. Having a projector will give them access to more resources at the click of a mouse.

Three teachers in the World Language Department at Timberline Middle School received the Pat Buckner Collaborative Teaching Award. They will use the money to help fund needed equipment to develop a department-wide tool for assessing and showcasing student proficiency in speaking. The students will create digital portfolios in which their oral proficiency progress will be tracked for their entire enrollment as World Language students at Timberline.

All of the award recipients have agreed to present their projects either at the UFLA 2006 conference or in an article for the newsletter. Congratulations to all!

On January 5, 2006, President Bush launched the National Security Language Initiative. We included a short article about this initiative in our winter newsletter, and are including more details below. Please feel free to share the following information and websites with your administrators.

NATIONAL SECURITY LANGUAGE INITIATIVE

According to the State Department, "an essential component of U.S. national security in the post-9/11 world is the ability to engage foreign governments and peoples . . . To do this, we must be able to communicate in other languages, a challenge for which we are unprepared.

"Deficits in foreign language learning and teaching negatively affect our national security, diplomacy, law enforcement, intelligence communities and cultural understanding. It prevents us from effectively communicating in foreign media environments, hurts counter-terrorism efforts, and hamstrings our capacity to work with people and governments in post-conflict zones and to promote mutual understanding. Our business competitiveness is hampered in making effective contacts and adding new markets overseas."

The initiative has three goals:

- 1. Expand the number of Americans mastering critical need languages and start at a younger age;
- 2, Increase the number of advanced-level speakers of FLs, with an emphasis on critical needs languages;
- 3. Increase the number of foreign language teachers and the resources for them.

Fewer than 8% of undergraduates in the United States take foreign language courses, and fewer than 2 percent study abroad in any given year. (http://www.insidehighered.com/news/2006/01/06/foreign)

Only 24% of public elementary schools teach foreign languages, and only 44% of American high school students are enrolled in foreign language classes. (http://www.ed.gov/news/pressreleases/2006/01/01052006.html)

More Rigorous Curriculum = University Entrance

Utah is one of 8 states to receive \$300,000 in federal funding to encourage students to take a more rigorous curriculum in high school, including at least two years of a foreign language. The <u>Utah State Scholars Initiative</u> will be initiated over the next two years in the Provo, Jordan, Park City, and Granite districts.
