It is a humbling experience to represent so many great language teachers. We had a great conference in November, with many outstanding presentations. Five of them were recognized as particularly outstanding: Exploring Language Through a Summer Camp Immersion Program by Jeff Jackson, Harold Zentz, Gary Adams, and Trevor Smith; Teaching Latin Wwithout a Textbook by Wes Baden; A Virtual Smorgasbord of Projector Possibilities by Jake Sigafus, Brittney Misiego, and Margaret Merrill; French Songs 101 by Dave Nielsen; and La Familia Real Española: Hechos, Historia y Anécdotas by Baldomero Lago. Dave Nielsen will be representing Utah with his French Songs presentation at the annual Southwest Conference on Language Teaching (SWCOLT) in April.

I have heard from several colleagues that they are quite concerned about declining enrollment in foreign language classes. Too often language classes are crowded out by the increasing number of required classes in other areas and/or by the growing list of elective classes available to students. I share your concern. It is often hard for young students to understand the importance of foreign languages. Nevertheless, I am optimistic about teaching world languages in Utah. The current strength of the Utah economy and resulting "surplus" revenue, as well as Governor Huntsman's expressed support – for education in general and foreign languages in particular – bode well for the future. One small step taken recently is allowing students to count an advanced foreign language credit as one of the required language arts credits for high school graduation. Hopefully we will see more steps in the near future toward recognizing that the study of foreign languages is an essential part of a quality education.

While it is impossible for me to see what teachers all around the state are doing, I know from what I have heard that good things are happening in the AATs, and most importantly, great teaching is occurring in foreign language classrooms. I wish I could know all of you individually, but I am grateful to each of you for the tremendous work that you do and for the opportunity to serve as president of UFLA.

Amy Kutsulis was recognized as the Teacher of the Year by the Utah Foreign Language Association on November 2 during its annual conference. Amy teaches Spanish at Orem High School. She previously taught at Wasatch High School, where she was selected as her school's Teacher of the Year.

Amy is respected by her colleagues, students, and administration for her dedication and professionalism. She is creative and dynamic, motivating students to learn and teaching them through a variety of instructional activities and practical applications. The Dean of World Languages at her school said, "Amy is a master teacher in the classroom. Each year she is creating new lessons aimed at helping students see the practical nature of Spanish. She skillfully taps into the things her students are interested in by creating lessons around music, television shows, and school events. For example, on a unit about fashion and clothing, Amy brought a clip from the TLC show *What Not to Wear.* Her students viewed the segment and then had to practice oral language skills by debating what they saw." 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
