Dave Nielsen (presenter – Best of UFLA) and Amy Kutsulis (UFLA Teacher of the Year) represented Utah very well. Dr. Tony Spanos from Weber State University received the Excellence in Teaching - Post Secondary Award. Bev Burdett, Shauna Winegar, Tom Mathews, Cheryl Hansen, and others did an outstanding job of pitching the 2008 SWCOLT meeting to be held in Salt Lake City. We were quite literally the "life of the party" at the business meeting.

We are excited to host next year's SWCOLT convention. It will be Feb. 28, 29, and March 1. This is a great opportunity to network with teachers from other states. Watch for details to follow.

Utah is making strides toward greater support of teaching languages. The State Board of Education has approved funding to pay for the registrations of 150 Utah public school teachers (K-12) to attend SWCOLT next year. Utah's universities may soon be requiring two years of high school foreign language for college admission. Business

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Teaching Heritage Learners

What is a Heritage Learner?

A heritage learner is a student who has some background in a language other than English, often because it is spoken in his/her home, but has little formal training in the grammar and complexities of the language. Often, counselors place these students in the Level 2 or Level 3 sections of the native language, thinking the student will have a successful experience, but the counselor doesn't realize what really happens in those Level 2 and Level 3 classes which are designed for English speakers. As a result, the Heritage Learner is either bored with the oral proficiency practice in the class or is behind on the basic grammar instruction. In each case, the heritage learner often becomes a distraction for both the teacher and the other students.

What can we do to help Heritage Learners?

Many of our in-state colleges and universities have been offering special workshops to help teachers meet the needs of heritage learners.

The next workshop will be a collaboration between BYU and USU and will be offered July 9-14 at BYU. TUITION IS FREE FOR THIS WORKSHOP.

However, if you want the 3 college credits you will need to pay a \$50 recording fee to have them recorded on your transcript.

But \$50 for 3 college credits is a pretty good deal!

Please note that the workshop will be taught IN SPANISH.

SUMMER WORKSHOP FOR SPANISH TEACHERS 2007

SWCOLT

SWCOLT works in conjunction with six different organizations to offer scholarships to language programs in Spain, France, Germany, and three locations in Mexico. The scholarships from the sponsoring organizations cover all or part of expenses such as tuition, room, board, and local travel. They do not cover transportation to the country of study, but SWCOLT supplements the scholarships with a \$200 travel grant for each recipient. If you combine these awards with a UFLA award, all of your expenses may be covered! (See the next column for details.)

SWCOLT offers three "Excellence in Teaching Awards" to recognize outstanding teachers of Languages Other Than English. One individual may be recognized at the elementary, secondary, and post-secondary levels. (This year, Tony Spanos of WSU received the post-secondary award! Yea, Tony!)

SWCOLT also offers the "Friend of the Profession Award" to an individual or organization not directly involved in the teaching of second languages that has made a significant contribution to the profession. This may include a principal who has worked to promote languages in his/her school.

"Honorary Lifetime SWCOLT Memberships" are also awarded to members who have made significant contributions to SWCOLT and to the language teaching profession.

The UFLA Teacher of the Year is named each year at our annual meeting. UFLA nominates each Teacher of the Year to compete for the regional SWCOLT Teacher of the Year. The SWCOLT recipient then goes on to compete for the ACTFL National Teacher of the Year.

Our USOE Foreign Language Specialist, Gregg Roberts, has been working with the state office and the legislature to promote foreign language study in Utah. His office will fund 7 workshops this summer and will pay for up to 150 teachers to attend SWCOLT in February. The state is also working to re-vamp concurrent enrollment, promote performance testing, and provide a means of certifying "UFLA Master Teachers." There is also a possibility that within a couple of years all Utah colleges and universities may add a two-year foreign language entrance requirement. 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Enhanced EdNet for Mandarin Chinese in Utah High Schools – Fall 2007

The Utah State Department of Education announced plans in March 2007 to introduce beginning Mandarin Chinese language courses in select Utah high schools through an Enhanced EdNet language curriculum program. The courses will be offered beginning Fall 2007 and applications to participate have been distributed to high schools by the Utah State Foreign Language Specialist, Dr. Gregg Roberts, with a deadline of May 15, 2007.

Funding for these programs was appropriated in the most recent legislative session in February 2007, and all participating high schools will qualify for funds to implement these courses. The proposed state plan is to increase the number of participating high schools each year to offer learning opportunities for all Utah state high school students interested in learning Mandarin Chinese.

The BYU Chinese Flagship Program, in coordination with the University of Utah, is helping the Utah State Department of Education to implement this innovative program. The Enhanced EdNet curriculum combines distance learning with in-class instruction. On alternating days a master teacher broadcasts through the Utah Education Network to teach and interact with students in their classrooms. On the intervening days, a classroom instructor works with the students to implement the language lessons they learn using classroom activities. Anyone interested in receiving training for classroom instruction should participate in the BYU summer STARTALK language teaching course to be held July 9th through August 3rd.

SUMMER CAMP FOR STUDENTS

ARABIC AND MANDARIN

BYU has been selected to receive STARTALK funding (part of Pres. Bush's push for increasing foreign language expertise). For the first time ever BYU will offer summer Arabic and Chinese language camps for high school students.

The <u>Chinese</u> high school language camp will take place from <u>July 16 to August 8, 2007</u> and students will receive high school credit equivalent to one to two years of high school foreign language credit based on an assessment test taken at the end of the program.

The <u>Arabic</u> camp will be <u>July 23 to August 17</u> and students will receive BYU credit for Arabic 101.

Students will live in the BYU Foreign Language Student Residence and daily experience various aspects of Arab or Chinese culture in an appropriate blend of English and Arabic or Chinese through films, games, cultural activities, cooking lessons, visits to mosques and restaurants.

This experience of acquiring facility in using Arabic or Chinese to successfully accomplish real world tasks is designed to whet students' appetites for additional study, leading to advanced levels of proficiency. We anticipate authorization to initiate the application process by May 25, 2007.

SUMMER WORKSHOP FOR MANDARIN TEACHERS

Through STARTALK, the BYU Chinese Flagship Program will be conducting a Mandarin Chinese language teaching course this summer for anyone interested in:

- High school level Chinese curriculum
- University level Chinese curriculum
- Enhanced EdNet high school level Chinese curriculum to be introduced this year in selected Utah high schools
- Chinese Flagship specialized curriculum

This course will be taught in a special four week Summer Term session from July 9th through August 3rd, 2007. Participants will be enrolled in Chinese 377, Chinese Language Teaching Procedures, and will receive three hours of BYU credit upon completion. The course is currently scheduled to be held every Tuesday/Thursday from 12:00PM to 3:00PM. There are a limited number of scholarships available to cover the cost of tuition.
