Times are changing. The problems that our students will face in their lifetimes are not limited to our local communities. As language educators, we have the wonderful privilege and obligation to prepare them to communicate and work with people from around the world.

I will finish as I began: with encouragement to make some time this summer to explore something new, push your comfort zone, and stretch you into becoming a better teacher. This may mean that you will need to change lesson plans or drop some pet projects when looking at what will help your students achieve the highest level of proficiency. It is worth it.

The deadline for submitting a proposal is October 1st.

2012 UFLA Video Contest

Thanks to all those who participated in last year's video contest. We are continuing it again this year. There have been a few minor changes in the rules (bolded below). The rules are as follows:

- 1. Participation is limited to students who are enrolled in a PK-16 world language class at the time of submission.
- 2. Only one entry per school will be accepted.
- The videos must be from the current school year or the end of the previous school year to showcase your student's end-of-year language skills. The deadline for submission will be Friday, October 12th, 2012.
- 4. Total video podcast length is not to exceed 1 minute.
- 5. There will not be a theme, however, if your student wishes to enter the ACTFL video contest, then they should follow the current ACTFL theme (http://actflvideocontest.org).
- 6. All videos should be in the target language, with minimal English. However, English sub-titles are strongly recommended.
- 7. The video podcast must be viewable by all audiences; "G" rating.
- 8. Category awards will be given for elementary, middle school, secondary, and post secondary. Within these categories, language specific groups will be separated as well.
- 9. Submissions will become property of the UFLA, however you will retain intellectual property rights of your video.
- 10. Cash prizes will be awarded to the 1st and 2nd place winners. Teachers of the winning entries will also receive a cash award for their class if their students win.

Videos should be uploaded to Youtube and the link needs to be sent to the contest administrator, Ryan Rocque (<u>rrocque@alpinedistrict.org</u>) by the contest deadline, October 12, 2012.

The UVU Language Summit was held the last weekend of April. It was put on by the World Languages Department of UVU. Teachers met from multiple languages and were able to share their best practices in teaching grammar, vocabulary and culture. It was a great opportunity to share and get ideas of activities that actually WORK in the classroom from other real classroom teachers. If you missed it, plan to attend next year. It's one of those conferences that is well worth your time to attend. Baldomero Lago at UVU is the contact person.

If you are looking for some summer workshops, there is an AP Institute in July and the Gateway to Learning Educator Workshops at the U of U in August.

The AP Summer Institute will be July 9-12 at Syracuse High in Davis County. You can learn more and sign up at http://bit.ly/intermountainAPSI. You may think that this training is only for those who teach AP classes but all of us are teaching students that will take AP and we need to work together for those students to be prepared for the AP exam. Through a sequential, 5-6 year study of the language we can get our students to reach the level of proficiency they need to pass the test AND prepare for the future. There are 18 sessions this year- some are specific to AP courses but there are also sessions in Pre-AP strategies for math, English, science, and social studies. Credit will be issued through USOE or WSU.

The Tanner Humanities Center at the University of Utah is holding the Gateway to Learning Educator Workshops throughout the summer. The session specific to Spanish is A Retrospective Look at the Mexican and Cuban Revolutions and is August 6-10 at the U of U. You can earn graduate university credit at a minimal cost and you get an excellent opportunity to study important cultural topics while spending a week conversing in Spanish with your peers. Thirteen Chinese teachers attended the UVU Language Summit on Saturday, April 28th at the Heber City UVU campus. It was a valuable time to get to know each other and the types of programs we are building. Discussion centered on program needs and the sharing of curriculum ideas. The state sponsored curriculum map was explained and distributed to those who were unaware of it, and it was a great time to compare notes and experiences. We look forward to attending this next year in even greater numbers!



Lehi High School junior, Mike Boyd, along with two other Lehi High School students, Brock Atkinson and Kaya Stokes, took first place as a team at the BYU Chinese Language Fair on Friday, April 13th. This qualified them to travel to Washington DC one week later with their teacher, Aaron Andersen, to represent Utah at the national China Bridge competition. There they competed against other national finalists for an opportunity to attend the international competition in Bejing. Mike Boyd took 2nd place after his speech (in Chinese) about the history of the Chinese Yo-Yo, and a dazzling yo-yo performance.

Mike studied Chinese for 4 years at Renaissance Academy, prior to attending Lehi High School, and has also attended 4 years at BYU's Chinese Summer STARTALK camp. Last summer he participated in the National Summer Language Institute for Youth (NSLI-Y), sponsored by American Councils, and spent 6 weeks studying Chinese on scholarship in Shanghai. This past school year he has volunteered as an aide in the 1st and 2nd Grade Chinese classrooms at Renaissance Academy, and continued to develop his language and teaching skills. He is currently in AP Chinese and hopes to be part of the BYU Chinese Flagship program upon graduating. Lehi winner, Kaya Stokes, is also a former Renaissance Academy student of Chinese. Congratulations to these students for their hard-earned accomplishments!

The 4th Annual Chinese Language Fair at BYU has grown rapidly each year, and this year saw over 600 attendees on Friday, April 13th. Along with the opportunity to compete in various categories, students represented their schools at various activity booths including games, food, and even face-painting characters. The large number of attendees continues to present logistical challenges in the available venue, says Ellen Knell, head of the event, and the BYU Flagship crew will be evaluating how best to address this issue in the future. On the flip side, we're happy to see the support for so many growing Chinese programs. Thank you BYU Flagship for all your efforts at setting high standards for our language students!



July 30 - August 3, 2012 - China: Past and Present

In partnership with the Confucius Institute at the University of Utah, this workshop, team-taught by China scholars from the University of Utah, will present an intensive introduction to the history and culture of China from ancient times to the present. We will explore various aspects of Chinese ethics, politics, literature, society and popular culture.

July 30 – August 3, 2012 – French and Francophone Studies in Society and Culture

In this workshop, a variety of expert professors from the French Studies program of the Department of Languages and Literature will help teachers maintain their French language skills; become better acquainted with important aspects of French and Francophone literature, culture, and history; improve their ability to interpret a variety of literary, film, and historical texts; and gain knowledge of materials that will be of use in their classrooms. This is a language immersion workshop that is taught entirely in French.

The Utah State Office of Education is a proud partner of this workshop.

August 1-5, 2011 – A Retrospective Look at the Mexican and Cuban Revolutions

This language immersion workshop, taught by Professor Angela Espinosa and Professor Gema Guevara from the Department of Languages and Literature at the University of Utah, will examine the half-century literary and cultural legacies of the Mexican Revolution (1920-1970) and the Cuban Revolution (1959-2009), including their hemispheric impact upon education, civil society, and popular culture. It will present a range of works by authors such as: Gabriela Mistral, José Vasconcelos, Che Guevara, and Gilberto Freyre. Teachers will become acquainted with 20th century Latin American and Caribbean literature, history, and film. A core objective of the workshop is for teachers to improve their interpretive skills, and acquire academic tools that will complement their own teaching. All sessions will be conducted in Spanish.

August 6-10, 2012 – The German Short Story

This workshop, taught by professors from the University of Utah's Department of Languages and Literature, will cover German short stories. Participants will read and discuss German, Austrian, and Swiss short stories that can be adapted to the classroom. This is a language immersion program and all discussions and films are in German. Participant teams will develop syllabi, teaching units, and materials to be shared.

Language News

This year's Chinese Language Fair, hosted by the BYU Chinese Flagship Program, took place on Friday, April 13th. Happily, this is not an unlucky day for the Chinese! We had a big crowd this year at the Tanner building with almost 700 students in attendance who participated in cultural booth activities, performances, and competitions. More contest categories were added this year with students competing in poetry, speech, talent, art, DVD, and a new China Bridge competition that included a team of students who gave a speech, cultural performance, and answered questions about China. We had about 10 school groups compete for the China Bridge honors, which were subsequently won by a team from Lehi High School. This same team took second place at the national competition in Washington D.C.! Congratulations to the team from Lehi High School and their teacher Aaron Andersen, and congratulations to all those who participated in the Chinese Language Fair this year!





Arabic Camp Opportunity

The National Middle East Language Resource Center (NMELRC) with headquarters at BYU was again awarded a grant to sponsor intensive Arabic language summer camps for high school students (as well as a teacher professional development component). The camp will run from from Monday July 9th to Saturday, July 28th. Students will be housed in the Foreign Language Student Housing Complex. The following options will be offered: 1) a fast-track option for those who have learned the Arabic script (but know little more) to complete the equivalent of BYU's Arabic 101 course and receive four university credit hours; 2) a parallel but more moderately-paced track will allow another group of approximately twelve students to complete the equivalent of a rigorous year of high school Arabic and receive the corresponding credit (no prior exposure to Arabic necessary); 3) a course for those who have completed the equivalent of Arabic 101 and want to press on and do Arabic 102 (four university credit hours).

The Utah K-12 Arabic Curriculum Project

The Utah Arabic K-12 Teacher Association, in collaboration with the National Middle East Language Resource Center at Brigham Young University, has been awarded a \$25,000 grant by Qatar Foundation International to create an Arabic K-12 curriculum that will be made available online for teachers nationwide.

The main objectives of the project are to:

- Groom talent through providing further training to Utah teachers to produce a cadre of experts who are capable of leading the field and producing curriculum and teaching materials.
- Create a repository of materials produced by teachers of K-12 Arabic nationwide.
- Create a sense of community among teachers of Arabic in the US and beyond.

The Utah Arabic Teacher Association was formed five years ago and is one of the few in the nation. The National Middle East Language Resource Center was created in 2002 to focus on increasing and improving opportunities for learning the languages of the Middle East. Funded by the U.S. Department of Education, it represents a consortium of language experts from more than twenty universities. Kirk Belnap serves as the center's director; Maggie Nassif is the administrative director. For more information on NMELRC projects visit www.nmelrc.org
