

#### **Utah's Bamboo Forest**

In China, where bamboo is an essential part of life, seeds of the Phyllostachys Nigra commonly known as black bamboo, are carefully identified and culled, planting only those seeds that appear to have the best chance for



sprouting, each perfectly positioned by hand in the ground. Once placed in the ground, each seed is individually fertilized with a deep drink of water and a handful of fertilizer from the farmer's heavy satchel.

For years the field appears the same as the day the seeds were sown. But, all the while there is much activity that can't be seen--just below the surface. The seeds of the black bamboo sprout slowly and just as slowly build a huge, connected, underground system of support for the vast bamboo forest that will surely grow at the proper time. A good, solid root system is what enables bamboo to grow quickly, and the better the root system, the bigger and taller the canes.

Every week, up until the 11<sup>th</sup> month of the 5<sup>th</sup> year, the bamboo fields appear visually barren. While the plants seem to be lifeless, those charged with their

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care and cultivation, tend to the task with devotion and faith. These patient farmers' process of watering and fertilizing is ritually carried out weekly for nearly five years. No rushing the process, no heavy machinery, no modern irrigation equipment--just individual farmers carefully tending the individual needs of each seedling in the field. They know that when the time is right, when the foundation is strong, when all has been prepared, the bamboo shoots will push up from the soil and quickly push heavenward.

Whatever diameter the cane is when it comes through the ground, is the diameter it will be its entire life. The strength it grained while still unseen is in direct correlation to the strength it will have for life. The Phyllostachys Nigra, once sprouted, grows over three feet per week, or over four inches every day! It is an amazing sight to behold. When finished pushing toward the sky, branches unfold from each node, further expanding the plant horizontally.



For many years, Utah's remarkable world language teachers have been quietly and tenaciously sowing, watering and fertilizing seeds. Their daily work, often back-breaking, may have gone unnoticed by the world. The roots they were fertilizing didn't seem to be producing results. Nevertheless, day after day, in classrooms around the state, French teachers, Spanish teachers, Chinese Teachers, German Teachers, ASL teachers and more, prepared lessons, searched for authentic resources, assessed student growth, wrote rubrics, counseled with parents, told stories, sang songs, and loved their students. Only these remarkable educators understood the essential groundwork they were laying.



A few years ago, on the 11<sup>th</sup> month of the 5<sup>th</sup> year, we started to see the first sprouts. Then, almost like wildfire, a forest of world language students, classes and even entire language schools burst forth. Administrators and lawmakers noticed. Other states came to observe the

phenomenon. Foreign governments and their educational leaders made long voyages to see how they could duplicate your efforts in their schools. What had once been just seeds, then an invisible yet vast underground structure, was finally being seen for what it truly was--a miraculous, languagelearning phenomenon.

Our bamboo forest made national news on February 6, when Utah's Governor testified before the U.S. House Workforce and Education Committee in Washington, DC, expressing the need for Utah (and all states) to focus on growing the economy through investing in education. Governor Herbert's address focused on three initiatives he is supporting. These initiatives are: increasing the percentage of Utahans with post-secondary degrees, ensuring more of our students pursue STEM (science, technology, engineering and/or math) education, and supporting world language instruction.

Yes! Our governor talked about the importance of World Language instruction to a national audience and not only mentioned it, but also went into great detail about the great things we are doing, about the forest of bamboo you created.

Why had so many of you worked so hard, for so long, and without recognition? From my experience, language educators do it because you "get it". You understand that students with global competencies are what will enable the governor's other two other initiatives—more college degrees and STEM skills--to truly enrich our state. You get that without the ability to operate seamlessly between cultures and in other languages, post-secondary diplomas and STEM skills are no longer enough. But most of all, language educators "get" that it is only through the cultural understanding gained through language acquisition that the world will truly change for the better. You are changing the world one child at a time—just as the bamboo farmers of China fertilize and water their unseen and future forests of bamboo—one seed at a time.

Utah's dual-language immersion programs are currently experiencing remarkable outside interest. These programs are a direct result of the tireless work of Utah language educators and visionary administrators. In those schools, content teachers are speaking in Spanish, French, Chinese and Portuguese to teach math, science, art, history, and they are adding in a strengthening dose of cultural literacy and tolerance along the way.

With 77 immersion schools from Brigham on the north to St. George on the south, immersion programs are available statewide and are currently serving 14,000 Utah students from kindergarten to 7th grade. The 25 Mandarin Chinese immersion schools in Utah represent a full 1/3 of the total Chinese immersion schools in the United States! We also have 2 Portuguese programs, 10 French (the largest number of French immersion schools outside of French-speaking Louisiana), and 40 Spanish. Imagine how much better prepared these students will be for the demands of the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

We anticipate that there will be more immersion schools opening in the 2013-2014 school year, and eagerly await the end of the legislative session to see how many. We have a bit of a sneak preview on six new programs that have already been announced. Next year the immersion program will spread to Cache Valley! Not only will Logan District add a Portuguese immersion school and a Spanish immersion school, but Cache District will also open four immersion schools--one each in Spanish, French, Portuguese and Mandarin Chinese.

What does all of this talk of dual immersion education mean for the majority of Utah language teachers who work in our secondary schools? What will it mean for our colleges and universities? The full effect of immersion education won't be felt for a few more years, and it will happen gradually as these children move up through our system.

Eventually, we will have thousands of junior high students with a second language proficiency in the advanced range. High school students will have already earned AP language credit and will be working toward a college minor. Once our linguists hit local colleges and universities, they will have almost earned a minor in one language and may be working on their third or fourth languages. This linguistic and cultural foundation will benefit them in any field and open countless doors.

Is immersion education the only part of the bamboo forest? No. The forest includes all language educators and all programs. Today, secondary and university language professionals are already feeling the effects of change. The world's spotlight has provided us with a platform on which to speak about the value of our profession and about the essential nature of our product. Parents and the community, in their overwhelming support of these programs, are rededicating themselves to ensuring that all children are equipped with 21<sup>st</sup> century skills. In our departments Universities, language and administrators are working to ensure that they can provide us with the number of highly-fluent and specially-trained language teachers we need now, and they are currently working on ways to meet the needs as our numbers grow exponentially each year. The rapid growth in one corner of our forest is encouraging and supporting more growth in all corners of the forest.

While immersion schools are garnering most of the attention, the largest growth has actually occurred in regular, secondary language programs. In 2006, the total number of students enrolled in Utah's K-12 public schools was approximately 505,183. In the 2011-2012 school year that number had risen to approximately 581,950. This represents an increase of almost 15%. During that same time, the number of secondary students enrolled in a world language course also rose. Here is the good news: In 2006, Utah had 79,000 K-12 students enrolled in world language courses. Last year, that number had risen to 115,000--an increase of about 45%--far outstripping the 15% enrollment growth rate!

For all the years you worked without recognition, for the labor you performed with love and care, for the amazing growth you are now supporting, Utah World Language professionals from Kindergarten to the university level are to be congratulated and thanked. Thank you for seeing the potential of our children and for seeing the potential in our profession—even when no one was watching. They are watching now.

Do you remember what happens after bamboo reaches its full height? The tops of the unbreakable stalks send forth horizontal, leafy branches, creating a vast canopy. This lush canopy creates a habitat with enough shade, protection, and nourishment to provide for the well-being and growth of an entire ecosystem. The canopy of Utah's language forest is now beginning to send its branches horizontally. They will continue to spread and grow until the entire state is engulfed and every child has the opportunity to gain proficiency in a second language—whether they begin their language studies in kindergarten, first grade, 8<sup>th</sup> grade, or as a university freshman. Because of you, the miracle continues.

upcoming AAPPL Chinese testing (go to http://chineseflagship.byu.edu), which will take place for many students this spring. During this competition, students will have a "conversation" with an advanced Chinese speaker. They will be asked questions about their family, friends, and leisure activities, to name a few, that will prepare Level 2 students to have a conversation via video chat as part of the upcoming assessment. Level 3 and above students will also do the video chat. In addition, the higher-level students will do tasks that are related to reading and writing. 


Rarely does a month pass when Utah's Dual Language Immersion programs don't receive some mention in the local or national press.
