UFLA Congratulates Award Recipients for 2013

UTASLTA was a recipient of the UFLA 2013 Pat Buckner Collaborative Teaching Award. They held a conference May 10-11, 2013 for all deaf and hearing ASL educators in the state. The award of \$1000 helped the organization defray some of the costs of the conference, including two workshops given by Austin Andrews, a nationally recognized ASL educator.

Dr. Stephen Van Orden, German teacher at Timpview High School received a UFLA Vitality Award for \$1000 this year. He is traveling to Germany with 29 students. They will live with host families, and while there, they will conduct video interviews about every-day life of students and parents of the students who attend the Franziskaneum School, the sister School of Timpview High School. When they return home, Dr. Van Orden will use the video footage to create interactive iBooks. The iBooks will give the students more opportunity to learn about the German school system. The iBooks will be used for class activities, and the students will also be able to download them onto their personal iOS devices. The iBooks will also be available to all German teachers in Utah. Dr. Van Orden is offering a workshop at SWCOLT in April for teachers on how to use iBook Author to make their own interactive iBooks.

Heather Christopher, German and Spanish teacher at Bingham High School and *Tracy Randall*, French teacher at Bingham High School are recipients of the UFLA Vitality Award. They attended the National TPRS conference in Dallas, Texas. Tracy is a new teacher at Bingham High School, and she desired to acquire and apply TPRS techniques in her classes. Heather has been using TPRS in her classes since 2002, and she went to the conference to improve her skills and to learn more about how to produce more proficient language speakers, especially in her advanced classes. They were each awarded \$750 to help with the conference costs.

Dr. Anne Lair has been designated as UFLA's Higher Education Teacher of the Year. Dr. Lair is a native of France and an Assistant Professor / Lecturer of French and Director of the French Language Program (lower level courses) at the University of Utah.

Dr. Lair was receipient of the 2012 ACTFL/Nelson Brooks Award for the Teaching of Culture in 2012. She has reached out to the broader community of French speakers in Utah since arriving here and regularly assists the Consul and Attaché Culturel in San Francisco with their efforts to promote French culture in the intermountain area. As USOE World Languages Specialist, Gregg Roberts, sums it up, "Anne Lair is a credit to her family, her profession and her community." Congratulations, Dr. Lair!



Jeff Jackson has been selected as Utah's Teacher of the Year at the secondary level. Jeff is a German teacher at Bonneville High School in the Weber School District. He has been a teacher for 19 years and has taught German for the last 15 years.

As a teacher, Jeff has worked on many projects that have benefitted students and other teachers including as District World Language Facilitator, District German Immersion Summer Camp Committee Leader and as a member of the State World Language Committee responsible for writing the state core. Jeff himself is a product of Utah world language instruction. He was a recipient of the Foreign Language Sterling Scholar award when he was a student at Bonneville High School over 25 years ago. Congratulations Jeff and thanks for giving back to the World Language community.




Janet Craven has been named as UFLA's Elementary School Teacher of the Year and will also represent UFLA at SWCOLT in April!

Janet is an Elementary Dual Immersion Chinese teacher at Foothills Elementary in the Jordan School District. She has been teaching in Utah Schools since 1976 and has held many posititions of leadership in the Jordan School District including district mentor, team leader of the 2nd grade at Foothills and a member of the Foothills Leadership Committee.

She was nominated by her principal, Barbara Yost, at the request of parents of several of her students. Amy Peterson, a parent of one of her students states, "Mrs. Craven has spent so much of her time planning lessons and organizing a wonderful classroom that I know every minute of [my son's] day is packed with educational experiences. ... I know that as he is learning Chinese he is also learning all of the Second Grade Curriculum."

It is with sadness that we announce the passing of former UFLA president and longtime Spanish professor at Brigham Young University, Dr. Robert Alan Meredith. Alan

passed away December 26, 2013 at age 68 after a long battle with cancer.

Alan grew up in North Hollywood and served an LDS mission to Uruguay. Following his mission, he attended BYU where he earned a B.A. and M.A., and later completed a Ph.D. in Foreign Language Education at Ohio State University.

In 1967 Alan married Kathleen Belle Katz, and together they raised nine children. After Kathleen's untimely death, Alan married Annebel Eklof Mathews in 1994

and thereupon inherited an additional five stepchildren. Alan was a devoted father to his children and a loving grandfather to 43 grandchildren.

In 1979 Alan accepted a professorial position at BYU, where he taught undergraduate and graduate classes in Spanish Pedagogy until his retirement in 2012. Among his many contributions to BYU were training and supervising student instructors, co-authoring the textbook Háblame!, serving as head of the Spanish Pedagogy section, and organizing the competitive events at BYU's annual Spanish Fair for K-12 students. For many years he also directed BYU's Summer Institute in Spain, offering dozens of junior high and high school Spanish teachers the opportunity to hone their language and teaching skills.

Alan will be remembered for his dedication to his students, his love of the Spanish language and Hispanic cultures, his offbeat sense of humor, and his selfless service to the language teaching profession. He truly made a difference in the lives of many people.

UFLA 2015 moves to February

The UFLA Board recently decided to move the UFLA conference from November to February beginning with our next conference which is scheduled at Weber State University on February 19, 2015. This decision was prompted by the desire to move the UFLA conference to a time that is more convenient for more members. The fall conference has typically been a few weeks before the ACTFL conference and for those who attend both, has caused some hardship. It is also a rush to prepare and submit proposals to present at UFLA when the deadline is at the beginning of the school year.

Moving the conference to February makes our conference at a more consistent time in regards to SWCOLT. Because Utah typically hosts SWCOLT each seven years, it is more logical to have our conference closer to the SWCOLT conference time frame (typically late March to mid-April). Although it may seem like we have skipped a UFLA conference this year, we have frequently in the past held UFLA in conjunction with SWCOLT (as we are doing this year) because UFLA plays a large role in helping to put on SWCOLT and because many of the presenters at SWCOLT come from Utah in the years we host it.

The newsletter will still come out three times a year and all UFLA Awards and Scholarships are still available to current members. We hope this will help more of you to attend and make presentations at UFLA next year and in the meantime, we encourage you to get involved in the teacher's organizations for the specific language(s) you teach.

We look forward to seeing you all at SWCOLT in April and again at Weber State on February 19, 2015.

As a District, we are honored to have the first German DLI (Dual Language Immersion) program in Utah. Our Board of Education, administrative team, teachers, and parents are truly excited about this new undertaking with Dual Language programs. We are implementing all five languages available into five different elementary schools next year. The German DLI program will be housed at West Elementary. As Superintendent, I consider this a wonderful academic opportunity for our district and students. It is also gives me much personal satisfaction. On a side note, I served an LDS mission in München back in 1981 and taught German at the Missionary Training Center in Provo for 2 years after I returned. I may have to brush up on all things "auf Deutsch."

When: Thursday, October 9, 2014 Where: Multiple locations around the State (Universities or Secondary Schools) Theme: *Märchen, Sagen und Legenden*

Goals: Through an engaging German Day 2014, we hope to create opportunities to build bridges between programs (high school to university, high school to high school, middle school to high school). We want our students to be able to make connections with other German learners through real communication in an authentic cultural context. We anticipate building increased momentum for German acquisition at our various sites through this experience.

Participation: Schools participating in the German Day 2014 will have the opportunity to prepare for the event with a common, several-day curriculum introducing students to the theme of *Märchen, Sagen und Legenden*. Participating Students will be required to prepare a work product (skit, poster, presentation, video, radio play, graphic novel) that they will share with other students at the German Day. Schools can continue working with the theme after the German Day if they choose.

Program: The German Day program will take place from 9:00-12:00. The program will consist of breakout sessions where students can share their prepared work products, an organized communication session where students can interact with each other in German, a large-group video presentation of a *Märchen*, and communal German lunch. We will also connect the various sites through live social media.

Responsibilities of Host Schools: Host schools will need to provide rooms for breakout sessions where students can present their work products and interact with each other. A host school also needs a room where the entire group can watch the *Märchen* together. Host schools will have the option of serving lunch. Host sites could charge a fee to cover the costs of lunch.

Next Steps: Our first step in planning the German Day 2014 is to find universities and secondary schools who are willing to host. We would like to have many host schools throughout the State. This will allow more schools to participate because they will not need to travel as far by bus. Secondary schools as well as universities can serve as hosts. For example, a secondary school could host the event for several neighboring schools and use the media center, gym, auditorium, German room, and cafeteria for the activities. A university could host multiple high schools and middle schools in rooms in the student union and classrooms in the humanities/liberal arts building. When we have determined the various sites for the German Day 2014, we can finalize more specific plans for the program.

Host schools will have flexibility in planning and carrying out the German Day. Think of it as a *Legoprogram* where host sites can build what they want from the pieces available.

A big "thank you!" to all of our K-12 Arabic teachers, who are keeping Arabic alive in schools across the state. Recently, I asked several high school students why they chose to take Arabic. They each told me it was because they had heard great things about the teacher. Keep up the good work!

I have spoken with several current BYU students who would like to teach Arabic in the future. This is exciting, because it means we may be able to reinstate Arabic classes in some of the schools where it is no longer being taught. There are many factors in the decision, of course, but the difficulty of finding a qualified teacher is a recurring theme. Since Utah is on the cutting edge of Dual Immersion in America, it also wouldn't surprise me to one day see Arabic immersion here. The work you do in your classrooms each day makes things like this a possibility. I encourage all of you to attend SWCOLT this April. Some of you may think it isn't worth it, because there will not be presentations specifically addressing Arabic. As someone who attends conferences regularly, I can tell you that there is much to be gained from hearing presenters who are experts in language teaching. The best presenters are often those who are involved with languages that have a long history in K-12 education, such as Spanish, French, and ESL. You can get great ideas that work very well in Arabic. In addition, our own Belal Joundeya will be presenting. His games and activities will work in any language, but they are the things he uses in Arabic classes every day! You don't want to miss his presentation!



he Utah State Board of Education is currently soliciting public comments about newly proposed World Language K-12 Core Standards.

In early January, a draft of the new standards was presented to the Board of Education's Standards and Assessment Committee, which recommended it be distributed for public comment before a final draft is considered for adoption by the Board.

These new, proficiency-based standards were requested by multiple school districts, charter schools, teachers, parents, business leaders, universities and legislators. They represent a revision of the 2009 World Language Core Standards and are a result of work done by a committee supervised by Gregg Roberts, Utah State Office of Education's World Language Specialist. The proposed new Core Standards have already been reviewed by several interested parties.
