Susan Davis, past representative for AATF and faculty member in Ogden High School, and Chantal Esquivias, UFLA President-Elect and faculty member in North Davis Preparatory Academy, are two examples of educators who have the desire for career development and are willing to undergo the necessary training to achieve this goal. In August, Chantal participated in AUDII, a weeklong DLI training sponsored by the Utah State Office of Education. Chantal described this training as "very intense, but instructive." Susan participated in a weeklong International Baccalaureate summer training in St. Pete's Beach, Florida, where she learned how to better incorporate authentic resources and how to better adjudicate student work. Susan also attended the AATF conference in Saguenay, near Quebec City, Canada. In her own words, Susan "made so many connections with AMAZING teachers from Chicago to Arizona." According to Susan, "[i]t was inspirational to learn more about how to run family/community events; how to better use social media, such as Google forms, Answer Pad, Padlet and Movenote; and how to run a state-wide French convention or an immersion weekend." In addition, Susan participated in a week-long French class offered by the University of Utah, sponsored by the State Office of Education. Besides being a participant and attendee at events, Susan taught a 3-day immersion summer camp to her IB high school students.

I would also like to share with you that I was fortunate to attend the "Training the Trainers of Interpreting Studies," an intensive week-long summer course offered

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by the London Metropolitan University, in London, England. This course focused on the current pedagogic methodologies in the field of interpreting studies. I spent a week interacting with other educators and professional interpreters while discussing and sharing teaching experiences, developing teaching materials, and receiving guidance for lesson planning, class interaction, assessment and feedback.

N Tow, I am aware that professional development gen- \mathbf{IN} erally comes with a cost, which may be a deterrent factor for many. However, you should always talk to your principal and district supervisor, since there may be funds in the school or district available for this purpose. Actually, did you know that UFLA also has a variety of scholarships available to its members? Take advantage of your membership perks such as the following funding opportunities: the Vitality Awards, the Pat Buckner Collaboration Award, the Joan D. Patterson Study Abroad Proficiency Grants, and the ACTFL/ SWCOLT Attendance Grants. For instance, Susan Davis's attendance to the AATF conference in Canada was half funded by one of the UFLA Vitality grants. Dr. Claire J. Kramsch to Keynote UFLA 2016



Claire Kramsch is Professor Emeritus of German and Education at UC Berkeley, where her area of research focuses on second language acquisition with an emphasis on social, cultural and stylistic approaches to lan-

guage study. After studying at the École Normale and completing the Agrégation in Germanic Studies at the Sorbonne, Professor Kramsch immigrated to the United States where she taught at MIT and Cornell before moving to Berkeley in 1990.

Until 2006, she was the founding Director of the Berkeley Language Center, a research and development unit for foreign language teachers. Her numerous publications include articles that have appeared in Studies in Second Language Acquisition, The Modern Language Journal, Die Unterrichtspraxis, The Canadian Modern Language Review, Profession, The ADFL Bulletin, PMLA, The Journal of Sociolinguistics, and Language Culture and Curriculum. Additionally, her 1994 book, Context and Culture in Language Teaching (1993), won the MLA's Kenneth Mildenberger Prize for Outstanding Research Publication in the Field of Foreign Languag-

es and Literatures. The book is a pioneering attempt to conceptualize the teaching of foreign languages as the crossing of cultural boundaries.

Additionally, some of her major awards include the 1988 ACTFL Nelson Brooks Award for the teaching of culture; 1994 MLA Kenneth Mildenberger Prize for Outstanding Research in the study of foreign languages and literatures; 1998 Goethe Medal; MLA Distinguished Service Award 2000; UC Berkeley Distinguished Teaching Award 2000; and she holds honorary doctorates from the Middlebury School of Languages (1998) and St. Michael's College (2001).

Her writings deal with various aspects of the acquisition of language in discourse, language and culture, pragmatics, aesthetics, and hermeneutic approaches to language learning.
