Once again, I am happy to briefly share with you some of the professional development and research activities with which members of the UFLA Executive Board were involved over the summer. Blair Bateman, BYU faculty representative, spent most of the summer working on the videos and online practice activities to accompany his recently released textbook Perspectivas: Português para Falantes de Espanhol. The videos, which were filmed in the Brazilian community in the Atlanta area, were possible thanks to a federal grant.

Lucía Taylor, Dixie State University faculty representative, conducted a study abroad trip to Oviedo, Spain. Students from DSU participated in an intensive five-week program at the Universidad de Oviedo. Half the group studied Spanish language and culture; and the other half attended a Medical Spanish course. As part of this course, students did community service at a local hospital. In addition, Professor Taylor presented a research article at the Nebrija International Conference on Applied Linguistics in Spanish Teaching in Madrid.

Finally, Ana Raquel Galán, AATSP representative and faculty member in North Davis Preparatory Academy, completed short summer online courses on mindfulness and meditation, and personal wellness. Ana explained that taking a break from language teaching, and focusing on her well-being for a change, was refreshing; Ana is confident that she is better prepared to do her job this school year.

UFLA Opposes Academic Pathway to Teaching

Over the summer, the Utah State Board of Education passed a new rule known as the "Academic Path to Teaching" (APT). The rule allows individuals with no pedagogical training or classroom experience, who hold a bachelor's degree in any subject, to be granted a teaching license provided they can pass a Praxis exam in the subject they want to teach and are mentored for three years by an experienced teacher.

The rule would have gone into effect automatically, but UFLA was one of several organizations that requested a hearing on the rule. UFLA President Isabel Asensio and board members Jeff Packer of UVU and Blair Bateman of BYU attended the hearing. UFLA spoke in opposition to the rule, arguing that (1) research shows that learning outcomes suffer among students taught by individuals with no prior preparation and no classroom experience; (2) the rule does not provide for experienced teachers to be compensated for mentoring APT candidates, in addition to all their regular teaching responsibilities; (3) the rule creates a double standard for teacher licensure, since the state does not allow universities to admit students to teacher education programs without a 3.0 GPA, a passing score on the ACT or SAT, and no grade lower than a "C," but imposes no such requirements on APT candidates; and (4) the rule does not require foreign language teachers to demonstrate oral proficiency in the language they teach.

Although the majority of those who spoke at the overflow hearing were opposed to the APT, the State Board of Education voted unanimously to implement the new rule, which went into effect in August. However, a number of school districts have issued statements explaining that they do not plan to hire candidates who are licensed through the APT.

Utah's Advanced Language Pathway for Post-AP Language Study: The Bridge Program

2016-17 marks the first academic year for the new Bridge Courses for advanced language study in Utah. Funded through the support of Sen. Stephenson and Rep. Hutchings, House Bill 152 provides ongoing funding to develop new, upper division university courses which fill the "gap" between students completing a World Language AP exam and the study of language in college.

The Bridge Program meets the need for a secondary pathway for Dual Language Immersion students, but its impact goes beyond this. By offering rigorous, academic language courses in the high school setting, and opening enrollment to any student who passes the AP Language and Culture exam, this program seeks to promote equity and access to bilingual and bicultural citizenship in Utah. It establishes a clear K-16 pathway and career pathway in two languages.

The first Bridge Course, SPAN 3116- Pop Culture, is being offered through Weber State at Layton and Viewmont High Schools in Davis District, and through the University of Utah at Olympus and Taylorsville High Schools in Granite District. Not only do students analyze the evolving nature of pop culture through topics like Lucha Libre, graffiti and dance—they also receive 1.0 high school credit per course plus 3 upper division university credits. This positions them to graduate from high school just 2-3 courses short of a minor in their language of study.

Unique to the Concurrent Enrollment framework, Bridge Courses count towards a university minor or major in their language of study and students have face-to-face time with a university instructor. Students receive daily support from a high school language teacher as well. The courses focus on improving language proficiency while studying upper division topics in the language, preparing students to exit from high school with high academic language ability more typical of students completing a language major in college.

UFLA Vitality Awards

Each year, UFLA offers up to three Vitality Awards for the purpose of research, study, workshops, or projects for improving the quality of teaching. Award amounts will typically range from \$500 to \$1000. In order to be eligible, teachers must be current members of UFLA; be contracted to teach in a public or private school, elementary through university level, during the present year; intend to teach this language for the at least three more years; and be willing to report and share their experiences with the UFLA membership.

In the past, successful proposals have received funding for language maintenance programs. Curriculum enhancement or course development, collaborative teaching projects, development of on-line courses and activities, travel to conferences or workshops, travel to collect language resource materials or to do research in teaching methods or language acquisition, expenses to give a presentation or read a paper at a regional or national conference.

UFLA will not fund tuition, travel or costs associated with graduate-level work or study abroad programs offered by Utah institutions.

Please consider applying for a Vitality Award. Often awards go un-granted because no proposals were sent in.

Vitality Award must be postmarked no later than March 31. Announcement of the winners will be made in mid April.

The scholarship does not include airfare, personal spending money or the additional fee necessary to obtain graduate university credits. Last summer, the graduate credit fee was \$325 for three semester credits from The University of California at Riverside. The value of this scholarship is \$2,195.
