Greetings Language Family,

I hope this message finds you off to a motivated and determined start to a new school year. Sometimes the start of a new year of school overwhelms me. With so many changes, updates, projects and adjustments, it helps me to step back for a moment and take a deep breath. As I do, I remember some valuable lessons from my life. During training in martial arts, my shifu often coached me to see my targets clearly. He was adamant that the efficiency of a trained fighter was found in moving smoothly and deliberately from target to target. Similar advice was given by a professor of mine once when she reminded me that my objectives were the basis of everything I did. I have found that when life gets a little crazy – school included – it serves me best to remind myself what I am truly trying to achieve.

In the last few weeks, several students have stopped in and reported to me excitedly about their experiences using their language skills in the real world. Many of these experiences are about being the only employee at work who could communicate with a customer or about interacting at a community event with someone of a different language background than their own. I am always elated to share in their victory, and I heartily congratulate them on their achievements. Something about their having used the language on their

own in the real world puts a light in their eyes I love to see. I have long encouraged students to take their language skills beyond the walls of the classroom. I tell them that the moment they use their language in real-life settings, language will mean something much more to them than just another school subject to complete or another class to take. It will become life, and language is meant to be lived.

Language has opened so many doors in my life – the most meaningful of which have been relationships with dear friends and associates. I think often of the people I might never have come to know and with whom I might never have shared a meaningful friendship were it not for the language capacities we shared. I also think of the literary enjoyments, rich music, academic insights, and travel experiences that have been added to my life thanks to languages I understand.

As a learner of Portuguese, I have my own experience to share. A number of weeks ago I was able to assist and connect with a Brazilian couple who came into our store to purchase picanha. As we realized we could communicate in Portuguese, they revealed to me that *picanha* was the most popular cut of beef in Brazilian churrasco. I conversed with them in my best Portuguese, and they informed me that they would be notifying their 800 Facebook followers that

our store not only carried *picanha* but had someone who could communicate in Portuguese.

And so, as I take a breath and focus on my targets, I believe the loftiest among them is the desire to get my students to make language a part of their lives and not just a part of their studies. If I teach them with this attitude, and they learn with this attitude, I believe both the process and the product will be remarkable.

I wish you all a successful year as you focus on your objectives.

# L2TReC Awarded Title VI Department of Education Language Resource Center Grant

The University of Utah's Second Language Teaching and Research Center (L2TReC) has been awarded a US Department of Education Title VI Language Resource Center grant. L2TReC is the first Title VI Language Resource Center in the Intermountain Region.

Title VI supports sixteen Language Resource Centers (LRC) that provide resources to promote and improve the teaching and learning of foreign languages by developing teaching materials, offering professional development opportunities for teachers and instructors, and conducting and disseminating research on foreign language learning. These centers are housed at some of the most prestigious universities in the country (Georgetown University, UCLA, The University of Texas, Indiana University, etc.) and each has a specific area of focus related to language teaching or learning.

L2TReC will contribute to the LRC program mission of improving the Nation's capacity for teaching and learning foreign languages by developing, showcasing and disseminating effective ways to articulate K-16 language education with particular attention to diverse pathways such as K-12 immersion and the Seal of Biliteracy.

Specifically, our work over the next four years will revolve around the following main areas:

- Identify, document and disseminate effective pedagogical and curricular practices for K-9 DLI instruction.
- Identify, document and disseminate effective pedagogical and curricular practices to support the transition from AP courses to college-level curriculum.
- Develop procedures to assess and mobilize proficiency of heritage speakers of Less Commonly Taught Languages.
- Organize professional development opportunities for language educators to promote models and practices grounded in an articulated vision of K-16 language learning.

Every year, the Southwest Council on Language Teaching (SWCOLT) offers this amazing opportunity to teachers to travel and study in Mexico and in Spain. In the past few years, very few teachers have applied for these travel/study scholarships...this makes the odds of winning unusually good. While it's still a competitive scholarship, you may be competing against only a handful of applicants. Utah has amazing teachers! If you have a strong desire to connect the teaching of cultures to benefit students, you should apply!

"Learn Spanish with Mexican Passion": This scholarship is chosen on a competitive basis to an instructor who is dedicated to further their own study and teaching of cultures in the context of language and to connect culture within their classroom to benefit their students. Recipients must commit to 2 weeks of course work. Open to instructors K-16.

Included: registration and 2-week Intensive Spanish Program (language and culture) course work in Cuernavaca, Mexico anytime in 2019.

2.) Cemanáhuac Educational Community Scholarship (K-16)

This scholarship winner is chosen on a competitive basis, awarded to a teacher that has had less opportunity to travel in the past, and who is committed to increasing their language fluency and ability while studying culture. In this light, this scholarship seeks to support a teacher specifically looking to improve their fluency

or language ability, and is not intended for a fluent or native-like speaker of Spanish. Recipients must commit to 2 weeks of course work. Open to instructors K-16. The recipient can study at any convenient time in 2019.

The scholarship is for Spanish language classes and intensive study of the arts and history of Mexico in an atmosphere of total immersion in the language and culture in colonial Cuernavaca, México.

The dollar value of this award in 2019 is \$1173.00, and includes: registration, tuition for two weeks, housing (double occupancy) with all meals.

3.) The Embassy of Spain Education Office Scholarship (K-16)

The Embassy of Spain Education Office offers a three-week 2019 summer course scholarship in July 2019, in a University in Spain to be presented at 2019 SWCOLT in Fort Worth, TX.

The scholarship value of this award is 1700 euros (around \$2000)

The scholarship includes

- tuition (60 hours for 3 weeks in July),
- full board accommodation
- medical insurance
- additional activities such as field trips might also be included.



#### Requirements:

- at least a Bachelor's degree
- an advanced level of Spanish (C1 recommended, according to the CEFR)
- work in the USA as a Spanish teacher or administrator involved in Spanish language programs
- Spain nationals are not eligible for this program

# Pat Buckner Award Collaboration in Teaching Project

One award of up to \$1000 is given annually to facilitate collaboration between two or more language teachers in the same department, school, or in different schools, districts or across the state.

Proposals for the Pat Buckner Awarded will be accepted from teachers who:

are current members of U.F.L.A., are contracted to teach in a public or private school, elementary through university level, during the present academic year, intend to teach this language for at least three more years, and are willing to report and share their experience with the UFLA membership.

Proposals for funding must:

Facilitate collaboration between two or more language teachers in the same department, school, or in different schools, districts or across the state, and result in a product (curriculum, video, technology, text, workshop, etc.) that can be shared with the membership of UFLA.

## UFLA Executive Secretary/Treasurer's Report

UFLA had a successful 2017-18 year. We had a great Conference at Weber State University in February. This was the second year since the State Board of Education no longer subsidizes the costs of registration for our Annual Meeting; we have not raised the cost or registration during these years. We had an impressive total of 392 teachers, students and exhibitors attend the conference. We were pleased to have Dr. Katrina Griffen, ACTFL 2017 Teacher of the Year, come in as our keynote speaker. The WSU Dept. of Languages and Cultures provided excellent facilities, as usual.

Last November, UFLA conducted two-day workshop at Dixie State University; Dr. Chantal Thompson from BYU, worked with large group of teachers on developing plans for proficiency. Thanks to Dixie State University for hosting this event.

UFLA performed 97 Proficiency Tests for world language teachers seeking endorsement in French, German, Spanish, Chinese, Portuguese and English.

The following individuals represented UFLA this year:

Electra Fielding, Jill Landes-Lee, and Arron Wheeler were part of the Delegate Assembly at ACTFL in November.

- As UFLA President, Jeff Packer attended ACTFL in November.
- As incoming President, Jared Nebeker represented us at SWCOLT in February.
- Leo Valladares attended the Leadership Initiative for Language Learning (LILL) in June.

In addition, the following awards were granted by UFLA through the year:

- At SWCOLT, Jorge Vasquez presented as Best of Utah and our Teacher of the Year, Melanie Malan competed regionally.
- Carrie Sandholtz, Rachel Gaines Eaton, and Terry Szink were awarded the Pat Buckner Vitality Award.
- The 2018 UFLA Poster Contest was won by North Davis Preparatory Academy (for the second year in a row!).

UFLA maintains tax exempt status as a 501(c)(3) charitable foundation and is incorporated in the State of Utah. We are current members of ACTFL and SWCOLT.
