the conference and you are more than welcome to attend and get involved.

Finally, SWCOLT 2020 will be in Disneyland (yes, you read that one right!). If you want an excuse to visit Walt Disney's Magic Kingdom during the school year without feeling guilty, this would be the perfect solution. Ryan Wells will be representing Utah as our Teacher of the Year. Ryan teaches Spanish at Taylors-ville High School and we wish him best of luck as our ToY! Our Best of Utah presenters at SWCOLT will be Priscilla Rebicki and Jéssica Martinelli Bell'Aver, both teachers of Portuguese.

I encourage you to consider participating in any one (or more) of these opportunities. I know that it is challenging sometimes making the time or finding the funding to continue honing and improving our teaching, but the effort is always worth it. We not only learn about new practices and teaching methods, but we also have the opportunity of exchanging ideas with peers and colleagues who have the same interest and enthusiasm in world languages as we do. It is always very rewarding.
